12th July

Now established as an annual event the West Suffolk Trundle organised by Ted Ashton and David Bradbury neatly fills the high summer gap between Cally's Trudges which open and close the season.

This year's ride started from the familiar Great Ashfield village hall, preceded by an energetic and enthusiastic beverage, biscuit and cake demolition exercise; as a varied fleet of bicycles and two tricycles assembled outside together with the inevitable horse-trading of bits and bikes which accompanies so many East Anglian events.

Ted informed us that the route was a re-run of a previous tour, on the basis that a number of people had got lost on the earlier occasion and we'd keep practising until we all got it right! Both the outward leg to the lunch stop at the splendid Flying Fortress pub/restaurant on the outskirts of Bury St Edmunds and the return offered a choice of route and distance to suit various rider and machine combinations.

A glance at the entry list will reveal that machines outnumber riders by a considerable margin – another Suffolk ritual. Carl Harper even managed to be involved with three during the day. Starting with a postman's cycle this had become one of the two Eddy Merckx sports machines by lunchtime and later in the afternoon Carl demonstrated the 'cycle with two machines' technique. More of this later.

We welcomed new girl Lynn Bickle who claimed not to have cycled for 28 years yet had no difficulty powering the other Eddy Merckx machine, an elegant ladies lightweight model (Edith Merckx?) of 1970s origin, saved from the jaws of a skip by Inigo. Nowdays 'pink painted bicycle' conjures up an image of that awful (and awfully familiar) Barbie-girl bright neon shade. Lynn's bicycle, however, shows that at least one person retained a sense of style in the oft-sad seventies as the machine is painted a delicate oyster-pearl pink with polished chrome mudguards and even sported a period square plastic Ever Ready lamp on the front fork. A splendid time-warp find.

Being 'garage sale day' for the residents of Thurston village on the way home, the sight of various unwanted cycles on driveways tempted many and a few succumbed. Problem: having purchased two cycles how do you get them home, in addition the one you're riding? Answer: Ian and Carl each ride one machine and lead the other with the left hand. This explains the appearance of the 1959 Raleigh Trent (duo-tone plus rust) and the 1981 BSA Victoria (sickly seventies nicotine brown!) – both ladies models – in the entry list.

Renovation for the two lady customers has now begun. Pete Stanners purchased a quantity of Pyrex and kitchen equipment at another vendor, which added to the luggage distribution logistics whilst offering little practical cycling benefits.
